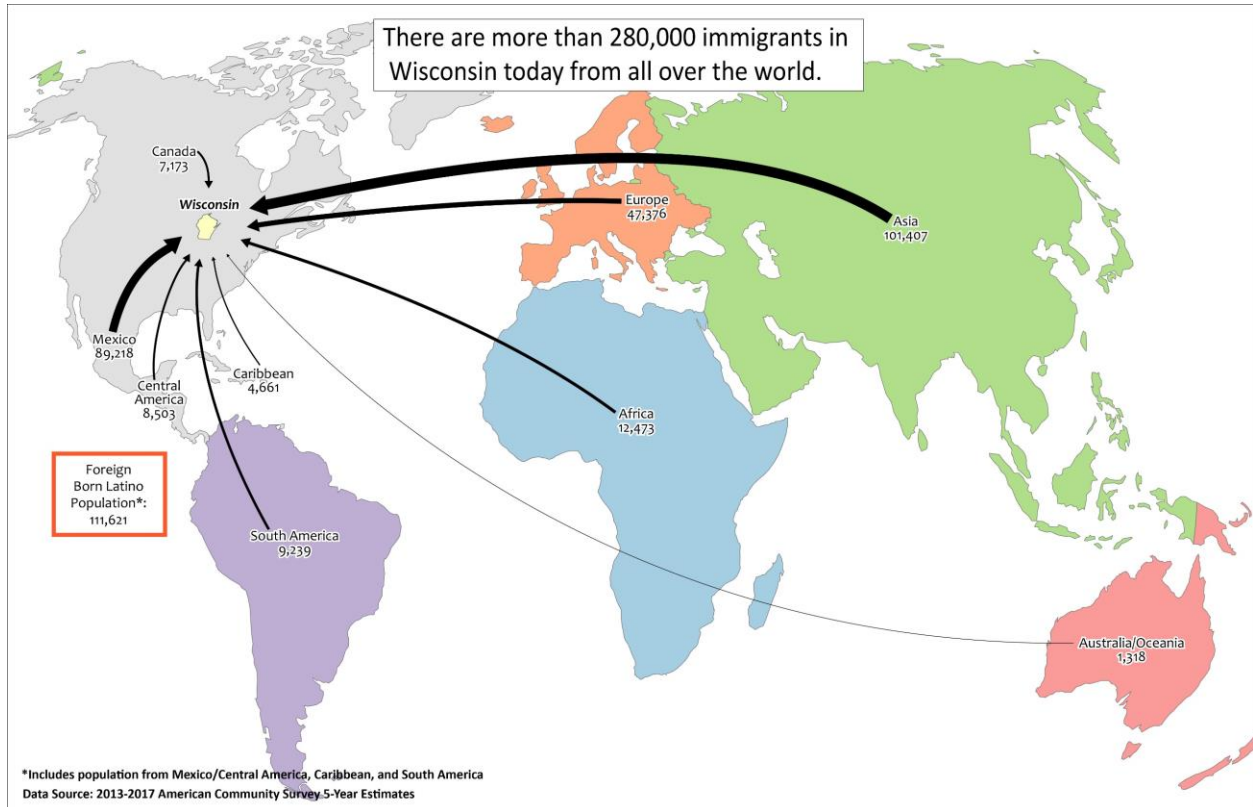


4.8% of the people living in Wisconsin today were born in other countries.

Where did their journeys begin?



25% of Wisconsin's residents in 1900 were immigrants.

Today, over 280,000 of Wisconsin's 5.84 million residents are immigrants. They have come here from more than 113 different countries!

In 2017, 31.6% of immigrants to Wisconsin came from Mexico. 8.1% were born in India. 6.6% came from Laos. Thais accounted for 3.7%, and people from China, 3.5%. Immigrants from European nations were 16.8%.

About 379,613 people in Wisconsin (6.6% of the population in 2016) were native-born Americans who had at least one immigrant parent.

72% of Hispanic people in Wisconsin in 2018 were U.S. citizens at birth.

89% of Latinos live in urban counties. Today, Wisconsin's Hispanic population is growing fastest in non-urban areas.

Nearly three in four (73.8%) Latinos in Wisconsin speak English at least “very well.”

In 2014, immigrant families in Wisconsin had \$5.5 billion in spending power and paid \$675.4 million in state and local taxes.

Unemployment is less than 3% in Wisconsin today. Immigrant workers made up 5.9% of the Wisconsin labor force in 2015. Immigrants filled nearly a quarter of the positions in Wisconsin’s farming, fishing, and forestry industries.
